

At least six months in advance, engaged couples should make an appointment with the parish priest to set the marriage date. Attendance at a Pre-Cana Conference is required.

CARE OF THE SICK

Please notify the rectory office for a pastoral visit to any family member who is sick, confined at home, hospitalized or in a nursing home. Arrangements for the reception of sacraments of the Eucharist may also be made through the rectory office. Ministers of the Sick are available to provide Communion to shut-ins on a weekly basis.

From the Pastor...



Third Sunday of Lent: Our Spiritual Sacrifice

Jesus' action at the Temple in Jerusalem is recorded in all four Gospels and is often understood to be among the events that led to Jesus' arrest and Crucifixion. The Gospel of John, however, places this event much earlier in Jesus' public ministry than do the Synoptic Gospels. In John's Gospel this event occurs at the very beginning of Jesus' ministry, after his first miracle at the wedding feast at Cana. Now let's see if we can put it together, for our present Lent!

Jesus does not come to destroy the temple, but to fulfill it, to reveal its true purpose in God's saving plan. He is the Lord the prophets said would come: to purify the temple, banish the merchants, and make it a house of prayer for all peoples. The God who made the heavens and the earth, who brought Israel out of slavery, does not dwell in sanctuaries made by human hands. Nor does He need offerings of oxen, sheep, or doves.

Notice in today's First Reading that God did not originally command animal sacrifices, only that Israel heed His commandments. His law was a gift of divine wisdom, as we sing in today's Psalm. It was a law of love, perfectly expressed in Christ's self-offering on the Cross.

This is the "sign" Jesus offers in the Gospel today, the sign that caused Jewish leaders to stumble, as Paul tells us in the Second Reading. Jesus' body, destroyed on the Cross and raised up three days later, is the new and true sanctuary. From the temple of His body, rivers of living water flow, the Spirit of grace that makes each of us a temple and together builds us into a dwelling place of God.

In the Eucharist we participate in His offering of His body and blood. This is the worship in Spirit and in truth that the Father desires. We are to offer praise as our sacrifice. This means imitating Christ, offering our bodies, all our intentions and actions in every circumstance, for the love of God and the love of others.

This Lent we reflect upon the meaning of this "sign" for us and for our world. We take this opportunity to consider the quality of our prayer and worship. In our prayer we seek to deepen our relationship with the person of Christ. In our worship with the community, we gather to experience anew the passion, death, and Resurrection of Jesus and its significance in our lives. Christ promises to be present with us in prayer and worship.

Road to Renewal

In these first three Sunday's of Lent we have experienced the temptation of Jesus in the Desert, experienced the Transfiguration, and now with the backdrop of Moses receiving the decalogue, we find Jesus overturning the Temple. In today's story we find that John places the context as soon after the first "Sign" or Miracle. This is intriguing and deliberate by the Church. I find all this saying to me that we must be rooted in the law and tradition, we must believe in the "real presence" of God in our lives, and we must return our love to God's, always. It is first and forever, God first! Trials and temptations and moral quagmire are real, but the endgame is us and how we engage.

If you haven't heard it, the Road to Renewal process was invoked by Pope Francis' call to Re-Evangelize our more recent losses, and to Evangelize the world in our time. It is designed to help us unite and grow stronger as the people of God. The particular model we are using incorporates the required reorganization put forth in the Chapter 11 process, and the Church's vision. Ultimately, we are forming our Church for the second half of the Twenty-first Century. Responsible to required State, Court, Church, and Diocesan Guidelines, our faith is at the core, rooted in scripture and tradition, passed down from Christ to the apostles and safeguarded and taught by the magisterium of the Church.

I have tried to listen to all, consulted with representatives and collaborated with the clergy. In the end, I am responsible to bring "Lakeshore Catholic Faith Community" and all its components through this process. I've tried to put forth things for the whole, and have done that through these vehicles (bulletin, webpage text and app). I will continue these and we are working on better ways as we go forward. I have learned from these first three weeks of Lent that we must be rooted in the law and tradition; we must believe in the "real presence" of God in your lives; and we must return our love to God's, always. For me it is first and forever, God first! Consider the same.
