# From the Pastor

Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time: Take and Eat

On this Sunday, we continue to read from the "Bread of Life discourse" found in the sixth chapter of John's Gospel. Recall that we have been reading this chapter for the past two weeks and will continue to read from it for another two. Last week, the crowd asked for a sign that would show that Jesus came from God. Jesus replied by saying that he is the sign and the bread of life sent by God.

Sometimes we feel like Elijah in today's First Reading. We want to lie down and die, keenly aware of our failures -- that we seem to be getting no better at doing what God wants of us. We can be tempted to despair, as the prophet was on his forty-day journey in the desert. We can be tempted to "murmur" against God, as the Israelites did during their forty years in the desert. The Gospel today uses the same word, "murmur," to describe the crowds, who reenact Israel's hardheartedness in the desert.

Jesus tells them that prophecies are being fulfilled in Him, that they are being taught by God. But they can't believe it. They can only see His flesh, that He is the "son" of Joseph and Mary. Yet if we believe, if we seek Him in our distress, He will deliver us from our fears, as we sing in today's Psalm.

At the altar in every Eucharist, the angel of the Lord, the Lord himself, touches us. He commands us to take and eat His Flesh given for the life of the world. This taste of the heavenly gift comes to us with a renewed command -- to get up and continue on the journey we began in Baptism to the mountain of God, the kingdom of heaven. He will give us the bread of life, the strength and grace we need as He fed our spiritual ancestors in the wilderness and Elijah in the desert.

So let us stop grieving the Spirit of God, as Paul says in today's Second Reading, in another reference to Israel in the desert. Let us say to God as Elijah did, "Take my life," not in the sense of wanting to die but in giving ourselves as a sacrificial offering -- loving Him as He has loved us, on the Cross and in the Eucharist.

Jesus is the bread of life, and today He adds that he is the living bread. Both statements help us understand better the gift that Jesus gives us in the Eucharist. We celebrate this gift of Jesus each time we gather for Mass. We believe that receiving Jesus in the Eucharist will lead us to eternal life. Choicest Blessings.

# Road to Renewal



This Wednesday, the Church rejoices as we celebrate the memorial of Saint Maximilian Kolbe. Kolbe was a 20th Century Franciscan

priest and martyr. He had a strong devotion to the Blessed Mother, which he manifested in the publication "Knight of the Immaculata." Over 100 years later, the magazine is still being printed and distributed across the globe.

Kolbe would often write articles for his magazine. In one of his articles he wrote, "The soul offers to the Immaculate its own acts of love not as one consigns an object to just any intermediary, but as her property, as her complete and exclusive property, since it understands that the Immaculate offers to Jesus these acts as if they were her own, which means that she offers them without stain, immaculate; Jesus, then, offers them to the Father."

As we prepare to celebrate the Solemnity of the Assumption, let us entrust our entire self to the Blessed Mother, for everything brought to her she brings to our Lord, who never disappoints His mother.

This week, on the memorial of Saint Maximilian Kolbe, two representatives from each of our parishes as well as the clergy of the family will be meeting with the Renewal Team. At this meeting, the counter proposals submitted last week will be discussed. We will not receive an official answer at this meeting. Rather, the Diocese intends to release the final list of closings the first week of September.

Let us continue to pray for our Diocese, Bishop Michael, the priests, deacons, and laity. Let us entrust all of our concerns, worries, anxieties, and frustrations to our Blessed Mother and the intercession of Saint Maximilian Kolbe. For we continue with faith that God will not abandon us.
